




What is Consultation?

Consultation is a formal legal process that governments must undertake with the authorized governments of the Métis people based upon Métis peoples inherent right to land, resources, and economic interests. The Crown has a duty to consult with Indigenous people when there is a potential for an activity to impact to Indigenous rights. Impacts can be caused by: projects (development/infrastructure), or changes in legislation / policy.

The basic process the MNA undertakes for consultation is highlighted in the diagram below. Through consultation, potential impacts to indigenous rights are identified which require either mitigation or accommodation.

- Mitigation: a technical adjustment to a proposed project that would minimize adverse impacts (for example, modifying a pipeline route or facility location to remove or lessen the impact).
- Accommodation: providing compensation for adverse impacts which cannot be avoided or mitigated.

Why is consultation important?

Consultation is a tool for protection of:

- Métis rights, claims, and interests;
- Métis culture, traditions, and quality of life;
- > The environment.

Effective consultation ensures Métis voices are heard and responded to appropriately. The Crown is required to engage in consultation with the representative government of an indigenous collective. For the Métis in Alberta, the recognized and representative government is the MNA. When a notification for a proposed activity which requires consultation is received, the MNA conducts a full review the proposal. This may include: developing GIS mapping, reviewing historical literature and archaeological sites, conducting Traditional Land Use (TLU) studies, citizen engagement events and development of reports.

Authority to Regions



Indigenous Rights are held collectively by indigenous people, including the Metis. Because indigenous rights are collective, the Crown must consult with a body or government that is of the indigenous collective as a whole.

Authority from citizens The authorized representative of Métis people in Alberta is the Métis Nation of Alberta (MNA). When Métis in Alberta apply for citizenship, each citizen declares an oath which authorizes the MNA to represent their interests as indigenous peoples, including for the purposes of protecting indigenous rights and undertaking

consultation and accommodation.

To ensure effective engagement of Local and Regional Leadership, as well as Metis citizens in the Consultation process, the MNA has delegated their collective authorization for consultation to a Regional Consultation Committee in each of the 6 MNA Regions. This delegation of authority is accomplished through MNA -Regional Consultation Protocol Agreements in each Region.

What is a TLU study?

TLUs identify the historical and contemporary exercise of the rights of Métis people on the land. These studies are a great opportunity for Métis citizens to participate in the consultation process! Ultimately, the goal of a TLU study is to tell "the story of a person's life on the land" (Tobias, 2000, p. 2). TLU studies are compiled by the MNA and form the evidentiary basis of the Métis assertions of collective indigenous rights. Considerations during a TLU include:

- Traplines & harvesting sites
- Medicinal plants locations & uses
- Sacred cultural sites

- Water bodies & organisms
- Animal use of the land
- Traditional Ecological Knowledge (TEK)

What is Indigenous Resource Management (iRM)?

IRM is an Indigenous Resource Management tool designed by the MNA specifically to facilitate a single window approach to consultation. The software designed to streamline and coordinate a multitude of interdependent activities including TLU data collection and safeguarding, receipt and management of industry notifications, and impact assessment. As a web-based application, the software is accessible by consultation staff in all Regions and is utilized to engage in and monitor consultation activities across the province while respecting Regional jurisdictional authority over those activities.

How can I get involved in Consultation?

Contact your MNA Regional Consultation Office to let them know you are interested in sharing your knowledge in upcoming TLUs, your availability, and the best way to contact you. The Regional Consultation Coordinators are also available to answer any questions you have about consultation and its process or to discuss any concerns you might have with a proposed project.
